


WILLIAMSON 101 LEADERSHIP EDUCATION COMMUNITY



County property taxes:	\$2.31 per \$100 assessed property valuation
Personal income tax:	None on wages and salaries; 6% on certain types of dividend and interest income
Sales and Use tax:	State 7%; local option 2.25% with maximum \$1,600 per single article of tangible personal property.
Corporate excise tax:	6.5% on net earnings
Franchise tax:	.25 cents per \$100 based on net worth or book value of property, or major fraction thereof, of a taxpayers net worth, determined under GAP, or the book value (cost less accumulated appreciation) of property that is owned or rented. Minimum \$100
Inventory tax:	None on finished goods inventory
Unemployment compensation tax:	0.15% to 10% of first \$7,000 in wages paid to each employee in calendar year. Rate is 0% for employers with reserve ratio of 20% or more. The rate for new employers is 6.5% for first three completed calendar years.
Local gross receipts tax:	Varies from .125% to .16% of 1%. Exempts manufacturers and certain professionals.








WHO'S MOVING HERE

Williamson Co. values in bold • National values in parenthesis




ENTREPRENEURS

INFRASTRUCTURE

TRANSPORTATION

Air

- 30 minutes from international airport with nearly 380 daily arrivals and departures
- Nearly 10 million passengers a year
- Serving 70 markets and 48 nonstop markets
- **Carriers:** Air Canada, American, American Connection, American Eagle, Delta, Frontier, Seaport Airlines, Southwest, United Delta Connection, US Airways and US Airways Express

Road

- A day's drive from 75% of the U.S.
- Eight miles from convergence of three major interstate highways: I-65, I-40 and I-24
- I-65 runs north-south through the heart of Williamson County, providing immediate access to I-40 and I-24 in Nashville
- I-40 directly accessed in Fairview in western Williamson Co.
- SR 840 runs east-west through Williamson County, providing access to I-24 and I-40 to the east

Mass Transit

- Intercity bus lines, Franklin trolleys (biodiesel fuel), van pooling for businesses and HOV lanes
- Direct bus routes between Williamson County and Nashville

TELECOMMUNICATIONS

• A strong fiber network with AT&T, Sprint, Level3, XO Communications, Windstream and Time Warner all having a significant presence

UTILITIES

Electricity

- All electricity is transmitted by the Tennessee Valley Authority, the largest public provider of power in the nation and distributed to commercial and residential customers through electric co-ops
- The Middle Tennessee Electric Membership Corporation (MTEMC) supplies 180,000 business and residential customers in Williamson and three other counties
- One of the 12 largest public electric utilities in the U.S., Nashville Electric Service (NES) services a small number of residents and businesses in northern Williamson County

Water

• Nine utility companies serve more than 39,500 residential, business and non-residential customers

Sewer & Solid Waste

- 11 companies support the sewer needs of the county
- Solid waste disposal is coordinated through five companies
